What does a Registered Training Organisations RTO mean

Using a registered training organisation to deliver nationally recognised training is good for your business.

Registered training organisations (RTOs) are recognised as providers of quality assured and nationally recognised training.

Only RTOs can deliver nationally recognised courses and qualifications

Role of an RTO: Under the Australian Quality Training Framework (AQTF), the RTO (Registered Training Organisation) is responsible for all quality assurance requirements in relation to the delivery of training. This includes assessment and certification.

How do we ensure quality training is provided?

The National Skills Framework: The National Skills Framework provides the basis for high quality, flexible, nationally consistent vocational education and training which meets industry needs and which employers can trust. The Framework consists of quality delivery through the Australian Quality Training Framework (AQTF), and through quality training products. The AQTF consists of registered training organisations and registering and course accrediting organisations. Quality training products are guaranteed by training packages which are nationally endorsed, and developed by industry, and accredited support materials.

How do I know whether the RTO will do a good job teaching the trainees?

All RTOs must meet the requirements of the Australian Quality Training Framework AQTF 2007 - A better system for everyone

The Australian Quality Training Framework (AQTF) is the national set of standards which assures nationally consistent, high-quality training and assessment services for the clients of Australia's vocational education and training system. AQTF 2007 is the current version of the framework, effective from 1 July 2007.

The AQTF 2007 Quality Indicators form part of the AQTF 2007 Essential Standards for Registration for training organisations that wish to deliver nationally recognised vocational qualifications and competencies. Further information on the Quality Indicators.

The Australian Quality Training Framework: The Australian Quality Training Framework (AQTF 2007) comprises national standards for the registration and auditing of training providers and accreditation of courses, and national standards for state and territory registering authorities.

AQTF 2007 came into effect on 1 July 2007 and is the revision of the AQTF to improve the quality of training and assessment in the VET sector. The new arrangements encourage greater participation of licensing and industry regulatory bodies in ensuring the quality of training, and will also achieve greater national consistency through new standards for state and territory registering bodies. Outcomes-focussed audits will allow providers to focus more on the quality of the outcomes of their training and assessment, which in turn will give industry greater confidence in the outcomes of training.

Approved Courses and Providers

How do I know if the provider of my course is an accredited Registered Training Organisation (RTO)?

You can find out whether your provider is an RTO via the National Training Information Service. If you are still unsure you should contact the Vocational Education Branch of your State Education and Training Department (details of which are available through the AQF Register).

How do I know that my qualification is an AQF qualification?

If you are unsure as to whether your qualification or the course you are interested in undertaking is an Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF) Qualification you should check that the title of your qualification corresponds with AQF Table of Qualifications. You may also wish to ask your institution or training provider whether your qualification is accredited

against the AQF. VET qualifications can be checked via the National Training Information Service and Higher Education qualifications can be verified via the AQF Register.

What are the benefits of being an RTO

Registered Training Organisations are providers of quality assured and nationally recognised training. Only RTOs can:

- deliver nationally recognised qualifications and courses;
- issue qualifications and Statements of Attainment for nationally recognised training;
- apply for state and commonwealth funding related to training;
- use the nationally recognised logo on all qualifications/statements of attainment issued;
- be confident that the qualifications they issue are nationally recognised by all other Registered Training Organisations. This means that those who receive training can be confident the skills and knowledge they attain are of a high quality and will be accepted and valued nationwide. It allows for students from one RTO to enrol, transfer or complete their training at another.
- promote the organisation's services to potential clients and partners on the national register of authorised training organisations, the National Training Information Service (NTIS);
- deliver training to overseas trainees (after meeting other regulatory requirements); and
- promote the availability of Austudy or Abstudy financial assistance to eligible students/clients.
